



I participated in numerous local, district and state events. After I graduated from graduate school, I became an Ag & Natural Resource Extension Educator for Kansas State University, a position I held for 14 years. I worked in a small two agent county so I shared the 4-H & Youth Development and the Economic & Community Development responsibilities with the FCS Educator.
